

Coral Castle

Ed Leedskalnin secretly built Coral Castle at night – excavating, carving and moving 1,100 tons of coral rock. Since 1923, scientists, engineers and scholars continue to be mystified. The methods Leedskalnin used to create this architectural feat remain unanswered to this day.

A self-taught engineer, Leedskalnin published in 1936 and 1945 a book and instructional pamphlets on electrical magnetism. Evident by the mathematical models of Edward Leedskalnin's Perpetual Motion Holder, a hand-carved nine-ton gate, a Polaris telescope – the world's only sundial with seasons.

Referred to as a Modern Megalith, Coral Castle is compared to the ancient megalith's of the Egyptian pyramids, Stonehenge, and is considered by many to be one of the Wonders of the World. Experience the Coral Castle with the continuous live tours. Guides will share the "Love Story," the history, the science, and experience how some of Leedskalnin's items work even after a century. It has been shown on the History Channel, Travel Channel, Discovery Channel, Ancient Aliens, Univision, BBC and much more. Billy Idol wrote the famous song he continues to sing in concert today called: "Sweet Sixteen." There is a fantastic short movie about the greatest mysteries of Coral Castle and its creator and builder -Edward Leedskalnin. You may also enjoy the delicious delights at the Coral Castle Café.

McKinney, Texas

McKinney's Historic Cultural District attracts guests from across the United States and around the globe. Stepping into the downtown square evokes feelings of nostalgia when exploring this picturesque and vibrant center of business. The buildings lining the streets date back to the mid-to-late 1800s and are filled with more than 100 mom-and-pop businesses including locally owned boutiques, art galleries and studios, specialty shops and a boutique hotel. Your group may also enjoy nightlife options in McKinney including live music at the restaurants, wineries and pubs, a comedy club,

hooka café, vintage video arcade and even a speakeasy.

"There is something here to spark almost everyone's interests, all found within several easily-walkable blocks," said Visit McKinney Executive Director Dee-dee Guerra. "And bus parking is easily accessible."

History buffs will enjoy visiting McKinney's three museums that provide a glimpse into the lives of early Texas settlers. The Collin County History Museum, housed in the 1911 post office, hosts rotating exhibits and programs. Chestnut Square Heritage Village is comprised of a general store, one-room schoolhouse,

wedding chapel and several houses including the oldest home in the county, built in 1845. The Heard-Craig Center for the Arts is based in a beautifully-restored home, built in 1900, and filled with an impressive collection of art and furnishings. Do not forget the centerpiece of the square, the Historic Collin County Courthouse, which was built in 1872 and houses the McKinney Performing Arts Center. Historic walking and trolley tours are also available for visiting groups wanting to learn more about McKinney's history.

Foodies will delight in the culinary adventures awaiting them in McKinney. Many of

Pullman National Monument and State Historic Site

After a multi-million-dollar renovation, the Pullman National Monument Visitors Center officially unveiled its new look in September of 2021.

The area became one of the first planned industrial communities in the United States when Engineer/Industrialist George Pullman founded the Pullman Palace Car Company in 1867 to manufacture sleeping train cars with a focus on luxury and customer comfort.

In 1894, the Pullman workers strike changed the American labor landscape prompting the U.S. Government to create a "Labor Day" holiday and changed American workers' rights and protections.

On February 19, 2015, President Barack Obama designated Pullman a National Monument and the first and only National Park Service unit in the City of Chicago. He also beamed about First Michelle Ladv Obama's great grandfather who had been a Pullman porter, a job

he was very proud of and passionate about.

Start your tour at the Historic Pullman Foundation Pullman Exhibit Hall for a 15-minute introductory video that provides an historical overview of Pullman and visit its museum gallery. Next, at the Pullman National Monument Visitor Center in the Administrative Clock Tower Building, groups can engage in interactive exhibits and peruse the souvenir gift shop.

While exploring the industrial grounds you will find the remaining buildings and features of the Pullman car shops. Walk through

the recreated historic worker's gate which stands as a symbol of the workers of the Pullman company and the labor they provided to create Pullman sleeper, dinning, parlor and freight cars. Explore the beauty of the residential streets of red-brick rowhomes as well.

Finally, do not forget to visit the National A. Philip Randolph Pullman Porter Museum which celebrates the contributions of Porters and the experiences of the African American railroad worker. Mr. Randolph formed the first African American labor union called Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

back to the 1800s. Browse through shops, where you will find jewelry, clothing, quilting supplies, a bookstore, restaurants, the visitor's center and an array of gifts. Our award-winning Henry County Museum and Cultural Arts Complex, located in an old Anheuser Busch building, takes you back in time and is worth seeing. In the middle of it all is the Henry County Courthouse, which dates to 1893.

As you soak in the small town atmosphere, do not miss the Memorial Bandstand, the Soldiers Memorial, the 9/11 Memorial and the granite Historic Fountain that was donated to Clinton in 1911 by the Human Alliance Foundation. Since Clinton is located on Truman Lake, it is a tourist destination for those interested in outdoor sports such as boating, hunting, hiking and fishing. Other outdoor activities

in and around Clinton include camping, golf, bicycling and more. Olde Glory Days is Clinton's 4th of July celebration featuring music, food, parade, carnival, games and more. Clinton offers Cruise Nights from May through October, BBQ contest, rodeo, wine stroll and quilt walk, just to name a few. Artesian Park has a pool, 18-hole disc golf course, ball fields, walking trail, playgrounds, shelter houses, tennis courts, horse shoe pits and an amphitheater. The Community Center offers courts, weights, track, exercise, indoor pool and more.

Clinton features three outstanding hotels: Hampton Inn, Parkfield Inn and Westbridge Inn. Bus parking is available on the square and of course, at the hotels.



Experience Jackson

Jackson, Michigan is an historic hotspot. Your group tour kicks off where the abolitionist movement began in Jackson County. The area is peppered with locations that were once key stops on the Underground Railroad. Both self-guided and group-led tours available.

The Michigan Theatre of Jackson began as a vaudeville theatre in 1930, with doors, goldleaf and architectural detail that will transport you to another time. Today, it hosts a variety of local and national acts, alongside current films and events.

Jackson has a history with car production, as can be seen in an incredible display of vehicles and memorabilia in the Ye Olde Carriage Shop – from pedal cars, to rare roadsters, both large and model scale.

The newly renovated Michigan Military Heritage Museum tells the story of those who battled for our freedom, with unique pieces and period uniform. From a nearly 60-pound Russian machine gun to an abandoned British cannon rescued from the bottom of the Detroit River, you are sure to find something to admire.





Jackson's Under the Oaks memorial honors the development of politics, as it honors the birthplace of the Republican party – where the party held its first convention.

Architecture in the City of Jackson is a beauty to behold. You will find the oldest continually operational passenger rail station in the country. In the summer, gaze into the colors of a classic Jackson tradition – The Cascades Falls. The Cascades are a manmade waterfall in the beautiful Sparks Foundation Park, and are illuminated with color and music for local and visiting guests to enjoy.

A handful of museums dot the county, with specialties such as a large collection of reed organs and restored train cars at the Lost Railway Museum, featuring the newly-installed virtual recreation of the Boland Railway. This exhibit puts you right into a train car and leads you through stops along a rich industrial period in south-central Michigan. Jackson's historic prison tours recall Michigan's first state prison system, with a few behind-the-scenes secrets along the way.

Columbia Gorge Interpretive Center Museum

Stevenson, Washington

Come experience 15,000 years of history at the Columbia Gorge Interpretive Center Museum. Located in the middle of the National Scenic Area in Stevenson, Washington, the museum is ideally situated to interpret the natural and cultural history of this beautiful region.

The first floor introduces the culture of the First Peoples, the Cascade Chinook. Discover the impact contact with other cultures had on them, the emigration struggle to the West, early community development, transportation, and the harvesting of resources. In the grand



gallery see for yourself the differences between the Cascade Chinook technique of dip netting for fish and the mechanical device, the fish wheel. Let our massive Corliss steam engine and our 1921 Mack log truck pique an interest in the history of the timber industry and the machinery of days past. Hanging in the grand gallery is a 1917 JN-4 Curtiss airplane, affectionately known as "The Jenny." This type of plane was commonly used in mail deliveries, crop-dusting, and daredevil stunts called barnstorming.

The mezzanine level emphasizes natural history with displays about geology, botany, and entomology. An exciting explanation of the geological creation of the Gorge is presented in a 12-minute program in the main theater. The theater comfortably accommodates 45-60. The second floor galleries tell the stories of real people who left their mark on local communities and concludes with an eightminute DVD program. Enjoy this light-hearted approach to the past and the future of the Gorge in a theater seating 24.


100 shops, just steps from the Staten Island Ferry.







Since 1875, pilgrims of many backgrounds and traditions have journeyed to the Basilica and National Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation, Carey, Ohio to experience the powerful intercession and the maternal comfort of Mary, Consoler of the Afflicted.

This Shrine began as a parish church in the 1860s. Then, Father Joseph Gloden, a native of Luxembourg, inspired other immigrants from Luxembourg living in Carey, to acquire a statue of Our Lady of Consolation, the patroness of their native land honored in the cathedral of the capital city. From the time that statue




arrived, countless people have experienced God's presence and Our Lady's intercession in a powerful way.

For people of faith, life is a journey leading ultimately to perfect joy and happiness in God's eternal presence. A pilgrimage is a journey to a sacred place; it is symbolic of life's journey and offers an opportunity to

Our Lady of Good Help Champion, Wisconsin

Among the most popular places for faith-based tours are Marian apparition sites. The best known sites are in Guadalupe, Mexico; Lourdes, France and Fatima, Portugal. These locations typically get as many as four to five million visitors and pilgrms annually.

What many tour planners may not know is that the only approved Marian apparition site in the United States is located in Champion, Wisconsin, just east of Green Bay. Known as The Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help, it commemorates the Marian apparitions of 1859 to Adele Brise, a young woman from Belgium who came to the area with her parents.

Three times Adele saw a woman dressed in white. She said: "I am the Queen of Heaven, who prays for the conversion of sinners, and I wish you to do the same." She gave Adele the mission of teaching the local children. This location is also the site of a major miracle when in 1871 the firestorm of the famous Peshtigo Fire

jumped over the Shrine as well as the people and animals that had taken refuge there.

Due to increasing bus tour visits, the Shrine has expanded and is now offering even more for bus tour groups. A second large parking lot has been built with designated bus parking areas. Restrooms suitable for groups are available at several locations. All points of interest are handicap-accessible including heated ramps in the winter. The recently constructed Mother of Mercy Hall is used for large events and pilgrim groups along with a devotional area that houses a beautiful stained glass window depicting the apparitions.



Other areas and activities include the church upstairs and apparition chapel downstairs where you will find crutches, canes and other items people have left behind after visiting the site. There is a gift shop offering numerous items of interest to visitors and pilgrims. Outside are stations of the cross, a long prayer walk as well as several statues and prayer areas. One particularly popular one is a beautiful grouping depicting Our Lady of Fatima and the three children.

Conway Scenic Railroad

by Brian Solomon

New Hampshire's Conway Scenic Railroad is one of America's premier tourist railroads and offers a variety of historic and scenic excursions in the Mount Washington Valley and over Crawford Notch.

Conway Scenic owes its heritage to the Boston & Maine and Maine Central railroads, routes that were built during the industrial age in the 1870s before paved highways offered transportation. The railroad was founded in 1974 by Dwight Smith, a career railroader and visionary who recognized the potential of the unique North Conway station as a tourist destination.

This beautiful Victorian station had been built in 1874 but had fallen into ruin. Smith and his partners restored the property and began operating excursions using a restored 1921-built steam locomotive number 7470. In 1994, Conway Scenic acquired rights to operate the former Maine Central Mountain Division over Crawford Notch and began running this supremely scenic line a year later. Today, Conway Scenic's *Mountaineer* is one of the region's most popular railroad journeys that provides a four- to five-hour trip through the Mount Washington Valley and over Crawford Notch.

The railroad's original North Conway to Conway run continues to be very popular with families and visitors with time constraints. This provides a one-hour historic train ride that aims to recreate the experience of traveling from town to town as it would have been in the Golden Age of American Railroads in the early part of the 20th century.

The railroad's 1898-built Pullman parlor observation car *Gertrude Emma* – named for Dwight Smith's late wife – is a star attraction on this run.

Conway Scenic also offers a variety of season special trains, including the autumn Pumpkin Patch and winter Snow Trains that run to the ski area at Attitash near Bartlett.

Conway Scenic's original steam locomotive 7470 was returned to service in 2019 after a number of years in the shop. This relic of the steam era continues to thrill visitors when it makes its occasional appearances. Most of Conway Scenic's regularly scheduled trains are operated with vintage General Motors diesel-electric locomotives dating from the 1950s and 1960s.

Bluegrass Scenic Railroad and Museum

The Bluegrass Scenic Railroad and Museum operates 90-minute chartered train rides through the rolling central Kentucky countryside past thoroughbred horse farto the palisades of the Kentucky river. Air-conditioned, first-class cars and exciting openair cars are available. In addition to train rides, the museum maintains an outdoor collection of historic railroad locomotives and railcars and an indoor museum of railroad artifacts. Golden Spike Tower

The Golden Spike Tower is the only public viewing of the World's Largest Rail Yard, Bailey Yard. From eight stories above guests can watch the workings of this massive yard, spanning 8.5 miles long and 2.5 miles wide, sorting more than 10,000 rail cars daily and features the only hump yard in the northern region for Union Pacific. The museum stands as the only organization interpreting the entire 2,000-mile Pony Express trail. As such, it attracts visitors from not only surrounding states, but the entire U.S. and other countries, bringing welcome tourism dollars to the local economy.

Museum staff and board of trustees work tirelessly to keep exhibits fresh. Many are hands-on, teaching guests history through visual and interactive exhibits. In addition to offering a glimpse of history, the museum rents out its large community room for your special event.
