## Q Casino Expands Houlihan's Outdoor Seating








Ferraro, has signaled his interest in carrying on the family's culinary tradition by learning to prepare the family's authentic, signature recipes.

## Bufferflies Returned to Tennessee Aquarium

From playful river otters and sleek sand tiger sharks to toothy American Alligators, there are certain animals that are undeniably iconic members of the Tennessee Aquarium's living collection.


However, some of the Aquarium's most entrancing, cherished residents — and there are literally thousands of them — have been absent for more than a year and a half.

Due to supply chain disruptions, the Aquarium has been unable to source butterflies to fill the Ocean Journey building's Butterfly Garden since early 2020. The Tennessee Aquarium's Butterfly Garden reopened to the public on November 5, 2021. This warm, light-filled gallery is once more filled with these jewel-like insects, which fill the air in their fluttering hundreds.

Walking through the Garden is a transportive experience, like being whisked into the steamy, lush wilds of a Costa Rican rainforest. To ensure the wellbeing of its residents, the interior of the gallery is always kept warm and humid. Seemingly every leaf, blossom and branch serves as temporary resting spot for butterflies of every description.

At any one time, the Garden houses between 1,000 and 1,500 butterflies. These can come from any of more than two dozen species, from cerulean-winged Blue Morphos to enormous Tawny Owls with their tell-tale eyespots.

Every week, about 500 butterfly chrysalises — the life stage between caterpillars and full-fledged adults — are delivered to the Aquarium from Costa Rica. By raising specific plants, Costa Rican farmers can attract butterflies that use the plants as egg-laying sites and feeding sources for their offspring. By collecting and shipping chrysalises to facilities like the Aquarium, farmers can earn a reliable income without resorting to destructive agricultural practices that threaten their country's life-rich rainforests.



The cocoon-like chrysalises can be viewed hanging from racks through a special viewing window in the Garden. Their shells often look drastically different from the butterflies within. Who would suspect that the familiar orange, black and white Monarch Butterfly would come from a gold-fringed, jade chrysalis or that leaf-like pink or green chrysalises are host to brilliant yellow Cloudless Sulfurs?

If they time their visit right – usually by arriving earlier in the day – guests may be lucky enough to see the butterflies in the act of emerging or flapping their wings to dry and prepare them for their first flight. Better yet, visitors can also watch a butterfly release, when newly emerged butterflies are collected and relocated to the gallery.

Guests are not encouraged to touch the butterflies, which can be harmed by even the most well-intentioned hands, but with such great numbers of these beautiful insects fluttering about, fingertips, shoulders and even heads often serve as impromptu perches. Those Instagram-ready moments are the kinds of experiences that can leave a lasting impression, Segbers says.

#### What's New in San Diego

A few things reopening in winter 2022 follow below:

#### Attractions and Events

The 3.2-acre Denny Sanford Wildlife Explorers Basecamp at the San Diego Zoo, which opened February 2022 on the former Children's Zoo site, will blend innovation with opportunities to explore a variety of species, ranging from leafcutter ants and orb weaver spiders to prairie dogs and sloths.

Opening March 2022, Sesame Place San Diego will feature seven Sesame Streetthemed rides, an interactive musical play area and 11 water attractions, including a 500,000-gallon wave pool – one of the largest in southern California. The park will also have an interactive Sesame Street Neighborhood complete with the iconic 123 Stoop,

live character shows, daily parades, photo opportunities and, of course, everyone's favorite Muppet characters.

#### Arts and Culture

Reopening April 2022, the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego will be expanding its La Jolla campus, allowing for the dedicated display of the permanent collection alongside the presentation of temporary exhibitions. The expansion includes clarifying the entry sequence to the building and expanding gallery space while integrating the complex existing conditions into a harmonious whole. A large, flexible multipurpose gallery on the lower level will provide capacity for public programs, artist talks, performance art, music and other immersive educational activities.

#### **Restaurants and Bars**

Opened December 2021 in University Heights, San Diego's first absinthe bar and bistro Wormwood showcases more than 30 absinthes sourced from Europe and the United States, which are served in slowdrip fountains with a cube of sugar. The bistro's French-influenced fare revisits classic dishes and features small plates and shareable entrees prepared with local ingredients from southern California and Baja, Mexico.

Coco Maya, by Miss B's Coconut Club, set to open on Little Italy's buzzing India Street in March of 2022, will offer an open-air aesthetic designed to reflect the boho chic vibes of Tulum, Mexico. Its main cocktail bar will sit under a massive skylight and the roof will be removed to create a 900-square-foot deck. The restaurant's Caribbeaninspired menus will feature tequila drinks and modern takes on Jamaican coal pot cooking from a Josper Charcoal oven-powered kitchen.

#### Transportation

In November 2021, the San Diego Trolley opened its expanded UC San Diego Blue Line that now runs all the way from the U.S.-Mexico border to UC San Diego in La Jolla to the UTC Transit Center, adding nine new trolley stations. The Trolley has on three color-coded lines connecting San Diego's east, south and north county communities with downtown San Diego.

San Diego International Airport (SAN) launched the "San Diego Flyer," a free electric shuttle bus service between San Diego International Airport (SAN) and Old Town Transit Center in November 2021. The shuttle operates seven days a week, with an average arrival every 20 to 30 minutes. The first pickup is at 4:45 a.m. and the last pickup/drop-off at 12:30 a.m., which are timed to match the schedules of the Trolley, Coaster, Amtrak as well as MTS bus lines.




#### **East Troy Railroad Museum**

The East Troy Railroad Museum will receive \$100,000 from the We Energies Foundation over the next five years. The money will fund new energy experience interactive education displays at the museum with the theme: Generating Green Electricity for Modern Mobility.

The funding will also improve the visitor experience by supporting new heating and cooling systems in the Depot, which houses educational displays and historic electrical equipment and controls. The Depot was built in 1910 as a substation for the Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company (TMER&L), which we now know as We Energies.

The East Troy Railroad Museum operates regular 14-mile round trip excursions from its historic East Troy depot and museum to Indianhead Park in Mukwonago, with a stop at the popular Elegant Farmer store and deli. This not-for-profit railroad is operated and managed by over 130 volunteers dedicated to engaging visitors in the heritage of electric interurban railways and trolley systems. 

Country Music Highway



The county is home to many generational cattle ranches, including the largest – Matador Ranch. Ranching and agri-business is the largest economic sector in the county. In Beaverhead County, there are more cows than people.

Beaverhead County cities include Dillon, the county seat, and Lima, as well as the communities of Argenta, Bannack, Dell, Dewey, Glen, Grant, Elkhorn, Jackson, Lakeview, Monida, Polaris, Wisdom and Wise River. Geologic features, abundant recreational opportunities; a rich cultural history and a wide array of events and activities make the county a very attractive destination for a vacation or a lifetime.

### Climate

## Coral Castle Miami, Florida


#### **Old Santee Canal Park**

### Crawford County Pennsylvania

For those who want to spend a rainy afternoon or a whole weekend immersed in unique history, Crawford County has a number of amenities that connect the region to not just regional history, but major events and individuals who shaped our nation's past. Everything from timeless architecture to the history of the underground railroad is explored including the man that helped get Andrew Jackson elected President.

While every town in America, it seems, has their own house museum that relays the history, in Crawford County, the house museum was owned by a United States

Supreme Court Justice. He is responsible for helping to acquire Florida, the Missouri Compromise and many of the nation's tariff laws. Mount Hope: The Baldwin-Reynolds House Museum was the former home of United States Supreme Court Justice Henry Baldwin, who served on the bench from 1830 through 1844 after spending time in Congress and helping Jackson get elected President. Baldwin lived in the house a relatively short time (dying within a year of its completion), but his descendants (and future Mount Hope residents) were major figures in the Atlantic & Great Western Railroad as well as much of the development of this region. The house is open as a museum from Memorial Day through Labor Day every Wednesday through Sunday from 12-4 p.m.

Another unique tour spot, serving as the main graveyard for the City of Meadville since 1852, Greendale Cemetery is much more than its name implies. The cemetery is as much a park or arboretum as a burial ground. It features the landscape design of Herman Munz, an architect who helped lay out much of the older section of the cemetery as well as planted thousands of rhododendrons on the property. These blossoms are enjoyed by visitors and locals alike each spring. The cemetery features walking trails near a waterfall as well as the final resting places of the inventors of the zipper, the wife of a






#### **Rosenberg Railroad Museum**

Rosenberg, Texas

The Rosenberg Railroad Museum is a hidden gem in the heart of Historic Downtown Rosenberg. The museum has a comprehensive railroad collection and exhibits that trace the story of Rosenberg, Fort Bend County and its deep roots in the railroad industry.

The museum's grounds are two acres and offer a park-like atmosphere. It sits next to four active rail lines, providing guests of all ages an immersive railroad experience. There are seven structures that guests can explore throughout the property with docent-led tours. Among those structures, guests can enjoy the Victorian Era 1879 Business Car; The Quebec, Rosenberg's very own interlocker Tower, Tower 17 (built-in 1903); and the museum's 1970s Missouri Pacific Caboose.

For model train fans, the museum has its own model train room with two HO model train exhibits on display and a Lionel O-gauge model train exhibit that is currently in progress. In addition, the Rosenberg Railroad Museum is the only museum near the Greater Houston area that offers guests of all ages the chance to experience a Garden Railroad. The museum's Garden Railroad is tailored to look like Historic Downtown Rosenberg in the 1950s and its surrounding areas.

For planners, there is plenty of parking space available for tour buses in front of the museum and a parking lot is also available where there is more than enough space for multiple buses to park. All the stops mentioned are within walking distance.

#### **Explore Historic Downtown**

After exploring the museum's grounds and experiencing the Garden Railroad's depiction of the town of Rosenberg in the 1950s, walk on over to Historic Downtown Rosenberg. Enjoy the restaurants, boutiques and antique shops.

#### Eat Local

Another Time Soda Fountain & Cafe is situated right across the street from the museum. Here, you will find delicious, all-American foods and original handmade milkshakes. Among the various mouthwatering options Rosenberg has to offer is the Ol' Railroad Cafe, where they serve an excellent all-American breakfast, lunch and dinner for everyone to enjoy. Perhaps you are a taco lover; Bob's Tacos is your stop.

### Home and Goods



## Oil Creek & Titusville Railroad Titusville, Pennsylvania

In operation for 36 years, three-hour, round-trip train rides are provided through the "valley that changed the world" and the history of the original Oil Boom is shared.

Each ride takes you through beautiful Oil Creek State Park as you hear the history of the valley as it once was and see how Mother Nature has reclaimed it.





June and September rides are Saturday and Sunday, departing at 11 a.m. July and August runs are Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday at 11 a.m. Fall Foliage Tours during October are Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at 11 a.m, and Saturday and Sunday at 10 a.m and 3 p.m. The ride through the park as the leaves are changing allows for some amazing sights. Many people ride just for the outstanding photo opportunities.



After the 1920 closure, the theater became named the Texan in 1934. The stage was turned. A catwalk was built. A large fly system was put in place. Many of these features are still in the theater today. Traveling shows stopped during WWII, and it became just a movie house. Things went dark again in 1974 when the modern twin cinema was built. The theater was just another antique store with space for quilting for many years.

In 2010 major renovation began. First the neon was remade so the town could see things happening and be ready for the grand new room. After 4¼ grueling years, The Texan Theater reopened her doors. She hosts acts from teenagers just starting out to legends like Marty Allen and Eddie Money. Dance recitals to movies. Mixing the modern with the old has made a very unique venue.




